

Wanda Clark, Longtime Assistant to Lucille Ball, Dies at 87

Wanda Lou Stamatavich Clark, who worked as Lucille Ball's trusted assistant for nearly three decades and remained a cherished member of the extended Desilu family, passed away peacefully on October 5, 2025, at her home in Langley, Oklahoma. She was 87.

Born in Arkansas and raised in Oklahoma, Wanda's life changed course after moving to Los Angeles in the early 1960s. While working at Look magazine, she befriended Cleo Smith — cousin to Lucille Ball — who recommended her for a position at Desilu Productions. Ball hired her without an interview, beginning a 28-year partnership that lasted until Ball's passing in 1989.

Wanda became a constant presence in Lucille Ball's life, managing correspondence, coordinating travel and schedules, and serving as a trusted confidante throughout the production of The Lucy Show, Here's Lucy, and other projects. She remained close to Ball's children, Lucie Arnaz and Desi Arnaz Jr., long after their mother's death

A frequent and very popular Beverly Boultinghouse, and many special guest at the annual nieces, nephews, and extended Lucille Ball Comedy Festival in family.

Jamestown for decades, Wanda delighted audiences with her warmth, humor, and firsthand stories of working alongside one of comedy's most beloved icons.

"Wanda cared deeply about preserving my parents' legacy — serving as a founding board member of the Lucille Ball Desi Arnaz Museum. Jamestown meant so much to her, and she loved returning for the annual comedy festival, where she shared stories, reconnected with old friends, and brought her unique perspective to those who gathered there," stated Lucie Arnaz

"Wanda was an extraordinary link to the history we celebrate every day... Her deep affection for Jamestown reminded us that comedy's impact – and Lucy and Desi's enduring story – is, at its heart, about people and connection," said Journey Gunderson, Executive Director of the National Comedy Center and Lucy Desi Museum.

After Ball's passing, Wanda continued working in entertainment and remained devoted to preserving Lucille Ball's legacy. She is survived by her sisters Marian Mushtare and Beverly Boultinghouse, and many nieces, nephews, and extended family.

Last week I was approached by Lori from the Chautauqua Gazette and she asked me to write a faith based motivational piece for their paper. I was a little apprehensive about this as when I have written pieces in the past there has always been a critic who no matter what I write they find something wrong with it, so I decided to take it to prayer. When praying over what to write on in this article, I debated on the words of wisdom that I could give to motivate people to be the best version of themselves. I thought of the people of Dunkirk, and thought about all the things that would make them happy: lower taxes, a Buffalo Bills Superbowl win, a mild winter, all things that I have no control over, so what can I give? So, it came to me, I can give some advice that could bring JOY into your life. This is my advice. You can take it or leave it, but watching and observing people not only as a priest, but as a former mental health therapist these are some conclusions I have come to realize.

In order to receive joy, we first have to define what joy is. It is not just happiness, as happiness is a fleeting emotional state, but joy is a deeper state of being that endures through trials and tribulations. Joy is more of an attitude and a way of living and an internal feeling compared to happiness which is due to external events that comes and goes.

So, how does one attain joy?

One may think it is about what we have: the big house, the fancy car, eating at the expensive restaurants, exotic vacations, the list can go on. But I am here to tell you, these might bring happiness, but not joy. In order to attain true joy, one has to sacrifice. The happiest people that I know are people that sacrifice their time, talent and treasures for others. These are the people that: are going to daily mass, working at the animal shelter, feeding people at the food pantry, volunteering to teach religious education, baking a casserole for the elderly neighbor, and so much more.

Just recently my mother bought a shirt for me that reads "Can't throw stones while washing feet." So often in our lives we are so worried about how other people have it better (hate to admit it, but I do this too all the time). But when we wash each other's feet and help our neighbor it is then that we realize how great we have it. Everyone has their aches and pains, everyone has their family drama and their times of desolation, but when we give our struggles and offer them to God, He walks the journey with us and gives us the strength to get through these challenges.

My brothers and sisters we are more interconnected to each other than we will ever realize. Science has shown us that we are linked with each other and what we do affects the greater world around us. In the bible, in the book of Genesis after Cain killed Abel, God asks Cain: "Where is your brother Abel? I don't know he replied. Am I my brother keeper?" SUNY FREDONIA STUDENTS GAIN OPPORTUNITIES THROUGH PUBLIC SERVICE

Students are enhancing their State University of New York at Fredonia education through Empire State Service Corps paid public service opportunities.

They are a part of a SUNY-wide cohort of some 500 students across 43 campuses who are participating in these experiences, performing at least 300 hours a year in community service in 2025-2026. They also collaborate and learn from each other's experiences.

"So far, they really like the experience. Most of what the Empire State Service Corps program offers is a way for students to engage in community service activities, while enhancing leadership skills," said Deborah Dibble, a program site supervisor and director of Student Health at the Health Center.

"What I am excited about is that it provides our students with meaningful opportunity for community service, so they get a reallife experience that any internship opportunities will provide," added David M. White, director of the Office of Multicultural Support Services and also a site supervisor.

Students are interviewed and hired based on qualifications and availability. Accepted students serve up to 10 hours per week at either an on-campus or community-based host site.

Evan Wolitzer, Meghan Kruszka and Molly Bowers have been assigned to Freddy's Locker, the campus food pantry in the Williams Center that addresses student food insecurity by offering food, toiletries and other essentialitems. Keeping track of orders, bagging items and ensuring that food is kept at the proper temperature are among their primary duties, according to all three students.

A key takeaway from the experience for Mr. Wolitzer, a sophomore Music Education major from Stony Point, NY, is recognizing that students experiencing food insecurity deserve compassion, not pity.

"Treating every client with dignity

reinforces their worth and builds trust. Another takeaway is realizing just how many people are food insecure and need pantries such as Freddy's Locker to have basic food sources," Wolitzer

Moreover, working at a food pantry cultivates empathy, adaptability and a deep understanding of social challenges and skills that are invaluable in any career involving people, leadership or service.

"It also sharpens your ability to communicate clearly, manage resources efficiently, and respond to real-world needs with compassion and strategy," Wolitzer added.

"Being kind and willing to help others" is a key takeaway that Ms. Kruszka, a junior Criminal Justice major from Hamburg, NY, has discovered from pantry service. Some students pick up food at the pantry because they cannot afford the high prices of food, she said.

"I can use this skill in my future career, gaining the skill of being more understanding and thoughtful of what others are going through," Kruszka added.

For Ms. Bowers, being open to new experiences and challenges has been a key takeaway. She's also developed soft skills, such as communication, flexibility and attention to detail.

"At Freddy's Locker, I have learned to be flexible, especially if we unexpectedly run out of an item in someone's order, we can always work to help someone find something else they would want," said Bowers, a firstyear student majoring in Biology with a minor in Visual Arts, from Gowanda,

There are currently 11 SUNY Fredonia students enrolled in the program, now in its second year. Assigned locations also include the Veterans Affairs office, Office of Multicultural Affairs, the Counseling Center and Thrift Room.

The Empire State Service Corp program encompasses nine categories: civic engagement/civil discourse, early childhood, FAFSA completion, food insecurity and SNAP basic needs, K-12 education, peer mental health, student success coaching, sustainability and veterans affairs outreach.


our family to a rental overlooking Lake Erie within the neighboring communities of Dunkirk and Fredonia, intending to buy as we got to know the area.

With the entire nation in our field of view, why did we choose this small, relatively unknown community? What do I tell those for whom "the city" means only one thing and "Upstate" is south of the Catskills? Well, honestly, I'd rather not tell them anything until we buy! The wine country, the nightly spectacle of sunsets over the lake, the communities geared towards families and the cultural amenities throughout Chautauqua County are all within the same travel time as my former commute to work. We have found more to love than even we expected as we narrowed our list of towns.

We arrived in late summer in time to enjoy the Dunkirk wharf and boardwalk. We were surprised and delighted with the cuisine we discovered on the boardwalk and off. We searched for preschools and found the excellent Northern Chautaugua Catholic School, where Principal Paul Pinto offered a personal tour of the town and made himself available by cell as we settled into the area.

In Fredonia, we enjoyed events in Barker Commons, took our son to his first ice skating lessons at the SUNY Fredonia rink and played and learned with other children at the very active homeschool group run by two local mothers. We've been to harvest festivals, concerts, plays and readings at the public library.

In truth, between Dunkirk and Fredonia, we've had little need to go to Buffalo outside of ferrying visiting family members to the airport. A trend has emerged as they come, skeptically, and leave enamored with this municipal pair. Our Oregonian relatives were shocked as they viewed pictures from last year's steelhead run and learned that world-class fishing extended from the lake to inland creeks and streams. Used to towns hours apart out west, they marveled at the quaint and quirky villages that

We've yet to meet a local who wasn't friendly, welcoming and helpful. We moved into a home with a threepage list of neighborhood parks and amenities, and we have a landlord to whom we send pictures of the home decorated for Halloween. Though we may just be incredibly lucky, even visiting family members remark on how friendly everyone

Yes, ominously, winter is coming, but having lived in several different states, I can say that there is a word for that: seasons. The region has them, all four, and the community has events and activities for each. To family members who have moved south, we understand, and there is always a place next to our fireplace for you when you begin to miss those snowy winters you've traded for palm tree Christmases.

Two Dates in Dunkirk

What can a City Historian contribute to our progress as a city? Of great importance is our greater understanding of what elements in our city have worked in the past. To know what these are, I have been thinking of two dates in Dunkirk history.

One date occurred in 1805, a day in February 220 years ago. Seth Cole, his wife Celia and their nine children arrived on the shore of Dunkirk near Canadaway Creek by ox-drawn sleigh, having crossed the distance from Buffalo to the creek over the frozen Lake Erie. They came to a land occupied only by the native Americans and for better and for worse they stayed. They are considered Dunkirk's first settlers. There was nothing here—not a village, not a store, not a house. Not even a road. Shortly after arriving, Celia gave birth to their tenth child. Within 5 years Seth would be dead, leaving Celia to raise their 10 children alone. But they had helped start a community at the edge of the lake, knowing nothing of the future of the area, nor their own future in it. Individual effort would be paramount, but from every "nothing" they faced, they and other newcomers found a way to build something. We, too, must build.

A mere forty six years after Seth's arrival there would be a vastly different kind of arrival. The date was May 15, 1851, possibly the most crucial turning point

in Dunkirk's history, but one which most Dunkirk residents have long forgotten. The people in charge of our community at the time knew how important that date was, including Walter Smith, a man of great consequence as he was the one person most responsible for Dunkirk becoming the terminus of the New York and Erie Railroad, a 4 mile stretch of rail from Piermont, NY, to

POMFRET & FREDONIA, NY -Nestled amid the vineyards, creeks, and rolling hills of Western New York, the Town of Pomfret and its village jewel, Fredonia, tell a story of pioneers, innovation and education. From a frontier outpost to a thriving college town, this corner of Chautauqua County has long been a place where progress meets tradition.

Long before settlers arrived, the area was known to the Seneca people as Ganadawao—"among the hemlocks." When early surveyors mapped the region, they called it Canadaway. It was along Canadaway Creek that the first European settlers built homes, drawn by fertile soil and abundant water.

The first contract for land in Pomfret was recorded in 1803 for Thomas McClintock. Early settlers David Eason, Low Miniger, and McClintock soon sold their holdings to newcomers such as Zattu Cushing and Hezekiah Barker.



Originally from Williamsville, New York, Lillian Pacos came to SUNY Fredonia to pursue her studies in biology—and quickly fell in love with the area. After earning both a B.S. and an M.S. in Biology, she spent a year living in Cleveland, Ohio, before returning to Fredonia with her husband, a Fredonia native. The couple recently welcomed a baby boy into their lives this summer. Lily is proud to now serve as the Town of Pomfret Historian, bringing a scientist's curiosity and a deep appreciation for local heritage to the role.

Dunkirk, that would make it the longest trunk line in the world. High ranking officials and businessmen had fought to make Dunkirk the terminus and they persuaded others to agree that the city deserved that day, and as a group they each contributed their part to put together all the components needed to make that day a reality. The Erie Railroad had begun building its railroad westward from Piermont, and in 1838, the eastbound section of track began from Dunkirk. The first train arrived that day, the 13 car train arriving in Dunkirk where a large celebration had been arranged. On the train came dignitaries of all levels of government, federal and state. President Fillmore was on the train along with most of his cabinet, military leaders and more. The governor of New York, Washington Hunt, was there. Benjamin Loder, president of the railroad was there. In fact 15,000 people from in and out of the county were there that day, a remarkable number considering difficulty traveling then.

It all marked a turning point for Dunkirk, which was probably until then destined to remain a fishing village, its then simple dock allowing for ships to stop as they traveled further west from the Buffalo area. Canon Leslie Chard, a City Historian noted in his book "Out of the Wilderness" that once the party was over, "Now it was time to go to work." In time, five railroad lines would pass through Dunkirk . In time thousands of people would pass through the city staying a day or more, some settling in the village, helping it to grow and expand. Many of them were immigrants put on the train in New York City to get them away from a thronging overcrowded city. Irish, and then Germans, then the Polish, and finally the Italians all came, finding their own role of the city. So in the time between 1850 and 1860, Dunkirk's population would grow from 2980 to 4000. In time it would be over 19,000. In time industry would grow. In time. All due to that event on that date in our history.

We don't study our own history enough, so we fail to recognize not just what the next important date might be but how to create circumstance that will cause that date to occur. In these 220 years of our presence on Lake Erie our city has faced elation and despair—and so I remind them so we can once recognize our duty to make another turning point occur. As present elements create a catalyst for more growth, city, county, and state leaders are now working to create another day in the city's history. City officials, the Planning and Development officials, the Dunkirk Economic Development office, Chautauqua County Partnership for Economic Growth (CCPEG), the Chautauqua County Department Planning and Development, businessmen and grant writers and leaders in development need inspiration and support and cooperation. Any aspect of progress must be supported.

In Dunkirk's City Hall a panting hangs on the wall of the meeting room. William Burt painted it. It depicts that moment in Dunkirk history when a 13 car train carrying the president of the United States arrived in Dunkirk, a village of little consequence.

Now it is time to work.

Cushing, a man of energy and vision, arrived from Massachusetts around 1805. He became Pomfret's first permanent settler and later the first judge of Chautaugua County—a pillar of the region's civic life.

Pomfret itself was officially established in 1808, carved from the larger Town of Chautauqua. The first town meeting that year elected Philo Orton as supervisor and confirmed Cushing among its early leaders. As more settlers arrived, Pomfret expandedeventually giving rise to towns like Ellicott (1812), Arkwright (1830), and Dunkirk (1859). Yet Pomfret remained the heart from which the region's growth began.

The settlement that would become Fredonia began around 1803-1804. For its first decade, it was known as Canadaway, but in 1817, the community adopted a new name: Fredonia. The term was coined by U.S. Senator and scholar Dr. Samuel Latham Mitchill, who combined "freedom" with the Latin suffix "-onia." While Mitchill once proposed "Fredonia" as a name for the entire United States, it found its home here instead. Fredonia was officially incorporated on May 2, 1829. By then, the village had already made its mark on history.

Along Canadaway Creek in 1821, settlers discovered natural gas seeping from the ground. William A. Hart, described as a practical and energetic man, gets the credit for drilling that


first well and establishing Fredonia's claim as the first community to be lighted by natural gas. By 1825, gas lamps illuminated shops and homes making Fredonia one of the first communities in the nation to use natural gas for lighting. That discovery led to the founding of the Fredonia Gas Light Company in 1858—the first natural gas company in the United

Among Fredonia's notable 19thcentury citizens was Elijah Risley Jr., a visionary farmer, merchant, and public servant whose work left a lasting mark on the region.

Born in 1787, Risley moved to Fredonia as a young man and quickly became known for his entrepreneurial spirit. He established the Risley Seed Gardens, which grew into one of the nation's earliest and most respected seed companies. His operation introduced scientific methods to agriculture, producing and distributing quality vegetable and flower seeds long before commercial seed houses became common.

Beyond his agricultural achievements, Risley served as sheriff of Chautauqua County, postmaster of Fredonia, and later as a U.S. Congressman (1849–1851). His leadership reflected the industrious character of early Fredonia—combining acumen with civic duty. The legacy of Risley's enterprise lives on in the town's

ongoing connection to agriculture, innovation, and self-reliance—values that continue to shape Pomfret and Fredonia today.

Fredonia's ambition extended far beyond agriculture and energy. In 1824, local leaders founded the Fredonia Academy, the first institution of higher learning in Chautauqua County. It opened in 1826, welcoming students from across Western New York.

With the support of Governor Reuben E. Fenton, the Academy became one of New York's first State Normal Schools in 1867—a teacher training institution under Principal

Joseph A. Allen. That same school evolved into the State University of New York at Fredonia (SUNY Fredonia), a vibrant campus known for education, music and the arts.

Fredonia also became a hub for reform. In 1868, it organized the first Grange chapter in the nation, promoting agricultural cooperation which is still operational. Around the same time, local activists helped establish early chapters of the Woman's Christian Temperance Union (WCTU), marking Fredonia's leadership in social progress.

Reform was not a new concept for this area. During the mid-19th century, Fredonia and Pomfret quietly served as stops on the Underground Railroad, offering shelter and passage to freedom seekers escaping slavery through Western New York.

Local abolitionists—including educators, ministers, and merchants—provided safe houses and coordinated routes leading north toward Lake Erie and Canada. Though secrecy kept many names unrecorded, oral histories and church archives suggest that homes near Canadaway Creek and along Main Street played key roles

in these efforts.


At the heart of the village stands the Fredonia Commons, a green square originally laid out by Revolutionary War veteran Hezekiah Barker, who donated land for public use. The Commons became the center for markets, parades and civic gatherings—and remains so today. Its surrounding 19th-century buildings form the Fredonia Commons Historic District, preserving the charm and craftsmanship of the early village.

Meanwhile, Pomfret's countryside thrived with vineyards and farms nourished by the Lake Erie climate. The tradition continues today through local wineries and agricultural innovation—a legacy seeded by early figures like Risley and nurtured by generations since.

Today, Fredonia remains the only incorporated village within Pomfret's borders. Together they form a community of about 13,000 residents, where vineyards meet lecture halls and heritage meets innovation.

SUNY Fredonia continues the mission that began two centuries ago at the Academy. The Darwin R. Barker Historical Museum preserves local stories, while annual festivals and markets on the Commons celebrate the enduring spirit of this historic town. From its early pioneers to modern scholars, Pomfret and Fredonia stand as living examples of New York's frontier determination and shared pride.

Each year, organizers refine the layout and schedule to make the festival more accessible and enjoyable for everyone—balancing the agricultural heritage that started it all with new attractions that appeal to today's audiences.

Tired and bored with being In the laundromat watching things go round and round? Why not grab a free book, sit down and spend some time reading.

Laundromat Literacy, a pilot project begun by the Rotary Club of Jamestown, New York just four years ago, is located in three different city laundromats. To date, more than 1800 books have been gifted to people who are customers at the local laundromats and who are looking for something better to do than scrolling their phones or watching the blue jeans go round and round in the dryer.

Using local contacts, the club got permission from three city laundromats to begin a pilot program. The idea was simple: build a bookshelf, get permission from the owner to locate the bookshelf in an attractive space, and set up a system of volunteers to service the bookshelves during the week, replacing the books that go out with new books. Each book has a label on it letting readers know they are free to take the book home with them and that it is a gift from the Rotary

Club of Jamestown.

"Rotary Club is an international organization of more than 31,000 clubs around the world, providing various volunteerdriven services for more than 100 years, and one of the Club's highest global priorities is education and literacy," said David Troxell, Rotary Club of Jamestown literacy committee member. "A main focus of the Laundromat Literacy Project is to involve as many children reading with parents as possible. With many parents spending time at the laundromat and bringing children along, this gives them the opportunity to read while waiting for their clothes to wash and dry."

The participating laundromats are located near the Southside Plaza, Northside Love School, and centrally located downtown across from the Northwest Arena.

"Never under estimate the power of reading, writing and imagination that comes from literacy," Troxell said."

Sometimes, the smallest investment of time can make the biggest difference. For students across Chautauqua County, a few hours spent with a caring adult can change the course of their lives. Through Chautauqua Striders' Mentoring Program, volunteers are helping local youth build confidence, find direction, and feel connected - to school, to their community, and to themselves.

One parent shared, "She has had a lot of fun going out and doing some things she normally wouldn't do and has built a good bond with her mentor. This program has been great for her to be a part of." Another added, "I'm glad my daughter has a friend and mentor who is another person to listen."

The benefits for students are clear: increased self-esteem, better relationships, and a stronger sense of purpose. One mentee reflected, "My mentor has made my life more fun and helps me see the bright side of life." Another shared a powerful statement: "I'm pretty sure that having a mentor saved my life."

Mentoring isn't just life-changing for the youth, it deeply impacts the mentors as well. "Mentoring has reminded me of the power of consistent support in a young person's life," said one volunteer. Another noted, "It feels good to be a positive influence on a child. I feel that I am making a difference in the future of a youth."

For many mentors, the experience brings joy, perspective, and a renewed sense of connection to the community. "My mentee brings a smile to my heart. I truly look forward to my days with her," one shared. Another reflected, "I love gaining the perspective of someone who is experiencing a different life than I am. I'm always impressed with my mentee's resilience."

Mentoring doesn't require any special skills, just the willingness to show up, listen, and care. Striders staff provide training, guidance, and ongoing support to ensure each match is successful and meaningful. Mentors meet with their mentees a few hours a month, often sharing meals, working on goals, or simply spending time together.

Every new mentor means another young person who feels seen, supported, and valued. As one mentee beautifully put it, "I like how the mentors treat me and I love how they are very supportive and will care about you no matter what."

If you have a few hours a month and want to make a lasting impact, consider becoming a mentor. Your time, attention, and encouragement could change a young person's life... and maybe your own!

The American Cancer Society provides the following guidelines for women at average risk:

- Women between 40 and 44 Have the option to start screening with a mammogram every year.

- Women 55 and older Can switch to a mammogram every other year or continue yearly mammograms.

Preventative screenings are covered by most insurance plans. This year, the Northern Chautauqua Community Foundation awarded TCC \$2,000 to help patients cover costs associated with mammograms and other preventative diagnostics related to the events. TCC also partners with Cancer Services of Western New York to provide financial assistance for those who qualify. TCC can assist patients with establishing contact with Cancer Services.







Carlson Brings Record of Success in County Government to Clerk's Race

I'm new to local politics, but not to county government. I've spent the last nine-years as the Director of Veterans services for Chautauqua County. During my tenure we've faced some big challenges, most notably a declining veteran population and COVID. Despite these challenges the Chautauqua County Veterans Service Agency has consistently been one of the top counties in New York State in delivering direct VA benefits to veterans and eligible beneficiaries, and has been verifiably successful in our primary mission.

The most important thing we do as an agency is facilitating direct VA benefits to eligible recipients. When we assist a veteran or surviving spouse in filing a claim for VA benefits, and they start receiving payments it is often life changing. But this also has a secondary effect of bringing significant money into the local economy. How significant? In Fiscal Year (FY) 2023 VA expenditures direct payments to eligible beneficiaries in Chautauqua County was \$60,165,000. And this number doesn't include indirect expenditures like VA healthcare. This is direct payments to county residents for VA Disability Compensation, Non-Service-Connected Pension, Dependency and Compensation Indemnity (DIC),Survivors Pension, and Burial Benefits. There are four other counties in New York State that have a veteran population within plus or minus 1,000 of Chautauqua County's veteran population of 8,094 (Rensselaer, Oswego, Rockland, and Chautauqua County Schenectady). ranks first in direct VA payments, with the next closest similarly populated county of Rensselaer nearly \$17 million behind us at \$43,238,000. If you look at the data for all 62 counties in New York State and calculate the amount of direct VA expenditure per veteran for each county we consistently rank in the top 10%. This success is not by accident, it's a direct result of setting the right priorities, and the expertise and execution of my staff

When I took over the Veterans Service Agency in October of 2016 it was at the very beginning of FY 2017 for the VA. At the end of my first year our county's veteran population was 10,027 with direct VA payments totaling \$45,581,000. Between FY 2017 and FY 2023 we lost nearly 19% of our veteran population (8,094 in FY 2023 down from 10,027 in FY 2017). Despite this loss of 1,933 in veteran population, direct payments to county beneficiaries increased in five out of six years, and was \$14,584,000 higher in FY 2023 than in my first year FY 2017. That is a 24% increase in VA dollars coming into the county over my tenure despite a 19% loss of veteran population during that same period. Direct VA expenditure per county veteran has increased by 40% since FY 2017, outpacing the 24% cumulative cost of living increases over the same period. As an agency we were able to facilitate higher direct payments to a smaller pool of veterans, with the increases exceeding cost of living adjustments during an unusually high period of inflation.

This record is relevant to my campaign because I plan on bringing the same data driven, result oriented mindset to the Chautauqua County Clerk's office. 





Medicare's Annual Open Enrollment is upon us. Each year individuals who have Medicare Advantage Plans, standalone Part D plans (Prescription plans) and Original Medicare A & B with a supplemental (Medigap) plan, have the opportunity to review their plans from October 15th through December 7th. This is an important time of year since many plans have changed or have been discontinued in the upcoming year. Even those of you whose plan is continuing into the new year have a limited chance of it staying exactly the same. Some plans feel they are making changes that will better suit you, but sometimes that is not always the case. Medicare Open enrollment is the time of year to ensure your coverage works for your health and financial situation. Even small plan changes can impact your access to care or out of pocket costs. Reviewing your available options is well worth the effort.

The Chautauqua County Office for Aging Services (OFAS) offers a Health Insurance Information Counseling and Assistance Program (HIICAP) through a

certified program provided by NY State Office for the Aging. This specific certification allows the OFAS HIICAP Counselors to offer assistance in helping you with an unbiased review of the various insurance plans that will be available for 2026. In addition to reviewing the plans, our counselors assist in screening for other benefits that you may need or be eligible for. Some of these include applying for the Elderly Pharmaceutical Insurance Coverage Program (EPIC), Extra help or the Medicare Savings Program (MSP). The Counselors can also help Caregivers and family members with reviewing the coverage for a loved one that they may be providing care to and who may not be able to review the plans themselves. This can be an overwhelming task for a Caregiver which OFAS can help navigate.

Along with Open Enrollment insurance reviews, OFAS wants to encourage individuals to reach out throughout the year with Health insurance issues and Medicare Preventative Services that they may be entitled to through their health insurance plans. Prevention is a key component in making the most of your health insurance. Be sure to ask your doctor about these services during your annual appointments.

community can be accessed to allow a senior to remain at home and retain the quality of life they deserve.

The senior in question needs to be on board accepting help, so your role – as a caring friend -could start with doing the research and knowing what's available. Finding the right resources, knowing the guidelines, understanding the regulations and asking the right questions is not easy. It takes time, computer and technology skills, the willingness to ask more questions, the patience to wait in a call queue and the confidence to understand eligibility.

You may find doing some chores with your aging friend or family member will create a bridge and make accepting outside help more palatable. Just seeing what's needed and getting it accomplished - lawn mowing, leaf raking, taking the garbage out, delivering a meal, driving them to appointments and being a friend who listens and understands can establish trust and a comfort level. Once the lines of communication are open, you can begin talking about maintaining quality of life, using help for the major chores and allowing the senior citizen a sense of control, independence and belonging.

The initial steps: Determine if the problem is life threatening – authorities may need to be involved if that's the case. Be honest in your conversations, offer concrete help and follow through. Don't take rejection personally, don't stop being a friend and supporter. Aging is a new phenomenon for individuals there is no road map, the process differs dramatically from person to person and from day to day.

Most agencies have a robust website and you can discover a variety of information - The Chautauqua County Office for Aging Services has an on line handbook that covers A - Z of services; this is a great reference tool to start with: chqgov. com/office-aging/Office-for-the-Aging. Other agencies' websites can give you an overview of their services, the eligibility guidelines and idea if a phone call or appointment might be appropriate. Establish communication with the family members. You have heard one side of the story from your friend – learn the other side so you offer the best help and support. We're all going to be there one day - aging happens across the social, political, economic, gender scale – helping one another just makes sense.
