

GRAPES, WINE & OUR REGION'S BEST

If you are the kind of wine drinker that's looking for \$30 tastings, over-oaked Chardonnays, and reds so thick and high in alcohol that you can't tell the difference between a Cabernet Sauvignon and a Pinot Noir, where the only true tasting note is ethanol, I urge you to fly west and skip the exciting, experimental wine scene that has blossomed in the Lake Erie Wine region.

Tucked between the heat sink of Lake Erie and the parallel ridgeline, this area has weather akin to microclimates much further south, allowing for varietals that even locals don't know exist in their backyard and tucked into shops in our quaint downtown areas. Yes, there is winter snow, but our relatively mild fall, coupled with cool coastline evenings, allow for grape varietals one would traditionally find in northern Italy, France, Austria, the Balkans, and

even Georgia. Yes, there are Concord grapes grown and sold to companies like Welch's and Growers Co-op, and the occasional (excellent) strawberry or ice wine one would expect, but it's this juice grape industry that helps fund the vineyards and affords vintners the ability to create world-class wines one can experience right here in the Lake Erie Wine Country.

BEYOND THE GLASS: WHY VISIT WINE COUNTRY?

If you think Lake Erie Wine Country is just about wine, think again. Yes, we have award-winning Rieslings, velvety reds, crisp whites, and the kinds of local specialties that make sommeliers take notice. But when you ask our guests why they visit, the number one reason they give has nothing to do with wine at all.

1. It's About the People You Share It
With

What brings most people to Lake Erie Wine Country isn't the wine—it's the company. Couples, friends, and families come here to spend quality time together, to catch up, to celebrate, to reconnect. The wine trail just happens to be the setting for those moments.

Something special happens when you slow down and travel together from one winery to the next. The road winds through vineyards and villages, and before long, the pace of everyday life fades. Conversation deepens.

Laughter comes easier. Phones get put away. You start to remember what it feels like to be fully present with the people who matter most.

or three stops along the trail and end up sharing stories with over a glass of something new.

That's what makes Lake Erie Wine Country so much more than a day trip. It's a reminder that hospitality is still alive and well here, that kindness is contagious, and that a day spent with good people is one of life's greatest pleasures.

2. A Sense of Place Like Nowhere Else

The second reason people love Lake Erie Wine Country is the unmistakable sense of place. It's a region where time seems to move just a little slower, where every curve of the road gives you another postcardworthy view of vineyards rolling down toward the lake.

There's something grounding about standing among the vines, feeling the lake breeze, and realizing you're part of a living landscape—one shaped by nature, history, and generations of families who have farmed and crafted here for more than a century.

Whether you're a visitor discovering this corner of the world for the first time, a local showing off your hometown to friends, or simply someone who's decided to take a break from the rush of everyday life, Wine Country offers a chance to pause and appreciate the finer things we often rush past.

A glass of wine tastes a little different when you're surrounded by the land that produced it. You notice the sunlight reflecting off the lake, the smells of the vineyards, the laughter drifting from a table nearby. You begin to feel a quiet gratitude for the beauty of this region—and maybe a bit of pride, too.

This is a place that invites you to breathe deeply, slow down, and remember what it means to feel at home.

3. The Craft Behind the Pour

Of course, the wines themselves are worth celebrating. Lake Erie Wine Country is one of the most diverse wine regions in the country, home to more than twenty wineries stretching across two states and fifty miles of shoreline. You'll find everything

from elegant European-style vinifera to sweet fruit wines and innovative blends that defy easy categorization.

But behind every bottle is a story. The "terroir." The soil, the climate, the work, the art. The dreams and passions of people who choose to bring a little something into the world to make it just a bit nicer. A team of tasting-room staff who love nothing more than helping guests discover their new favorite wine—whether it's dry or sweet, bold or light, "serious" or simply delightful.

That's one of the best things about our region: you don't have to be a wine expert to feel at home here. If you know what you like, we'll help you find it. If you don't, we'll help you explore until you do. Many of our wineries also offer locally crafted beers, ciders, or spirits, so everyone in your group can find something to enjoy.

What you'll experience in Lake Erie Wine Country is a celebration of craft in every sense of the word—the craft of winemaking, the craft of hospitality, and the craft of living well.

A Place Where You Belong

So, join me on a wine tour of some of our favorite hidden gems and meet a few of the passionate, quirky, experimental owners and growers who make this region and its wines exceptional.

Johnson Estate Winery 8419 W Main St Westfield, NY 14787

The first thing one notices upon entering Johnson Estate is the beautifully preserved and updated historic buildings. The barn tasting room, clad in timber, was originally a 1920s apple building. Alongside it stands the well-preserved family brick home, its walls several feet thick. This vineyard is an excellent place to bring the family and enjoy one of the guided walking tours offered on 115 acres of vines overlooking Lake Erie.

Johnson Estate is a historic vineyard. According to family legend, alcohol usually a Chardonnay fan, I was pleasantly surprised by the lack of overbearing oak in their Bright Steel Chardonnay. It tasted like what Chardonnay used to taste like before oak became king. I found it to be crisp, refreshing, and floral.

The tasting itself was an enjoyable experience, with wine stewards Kathryn Bronstein and Melissa Schrader providing lively conversation and excellent wine education. Each tasting costs around \$5 and includes light bar food to enjoy during your visit. Also, if you're lucky enough to visit during the winter season, you'll have the opportunity to try their delicious red or white mulled wine. One Melissa Schrader not only made me cup of each with slices of fresh orange and a stick of cinnamon, but also wrote out her favorite method for serving mulled wine at home. So, when the sangria weather passes, make sure to stop in for their excellent mulled wine.

imagined. In fact, it was from Randy that I learned that one area of the wine region contains 5,000 contiguous acres of vines, more than any area east of the Rockies. Also notable is that all of Courtyards' grapes are sourced within five miles of the winery, a rarity for the region, considering many wineries import at least some of their grapes from western states.

However, just because the grapes are local doesn't mean the vintners aren't searching far and wide for the best varietals to grow in the region. One of Randy's prides, and my personal favorite (I may have an empty bottle at home!), is their Saperavi. Originally grown in the country of Georgia, a region notable for being the first area in the world to show archeological evidence of viticulture, Randy found it a suitable grape for growing in the Lake Erie Shore microclimate. This full-bodied, dry red wine has notes of dark fruits and chocolate that any tannin lover can appreciate. Other notable wines include their Noiret and Zweigelt, a red grape widely cultivated in Austria. Similarly, their Captain's Series of barrel-aged wines feature excellent taste and value for those looking for a Great Lakes gift to take home to skeptical family members (if you can wait that long to uncork). The white wine logo even has an image of the Great Lakes made of sea glass.

In the end, Courtyard stands out as a winery with a family atmosphere, backed by a dedication to sustainability and a focus on selecting the best varietals to grow in the region.

also house-made beers and ciders, as well as counter-served small plates that can rival any Brooklyn gastropub.

Although Michael started the pizzeria thirty years ago, the gastropub and winery are now truly a family affair. On the day I visited, Michael was manning the bar while Lynn worked in the kitchen. The three daughters, Kariann, Allison, and Mikaela (named after Michael), are also intimately involved in the winery/pub, assisting with menu creation, beer and wine selection, and hosting special events at the venue. Currently, Kariann is finishing a wine-making program at Penn State, and Allison and Mikaela have helped host a 75-person event at Yori.

Again, in the interest of public service, I tried several beers and wines and found all of them to be excellent. I was skeptical of the variety of beer, as not many brewers can master a coffee porter and make a decent sour, but I was pleasantly surprised. Their Irish Stout was chocolatey and rich, but not overly filling, and their Coffee Porter nosed the fine aroma of espresso, tasted of chocolate, and was velvety smooth. Their Melon Sour was perfect, fruity and just sour enough, unlike the pucker monsters that are currently gaining in popularity.

Of their 33 wines, all but their merlot is grown locally. Two of my favorites were the Cabernet Franc, parent to the Cabernet Sauvignon, which has the feel of a full-bodied yet more complex Cab



production began on the property when patriarch Frederick Johnson planted apples and other fruits at the beginning of the 20th century, eventually turning to alcohol production during Prohibition. By 1961, the next generation of Fred Johnsons—father of the current proprietor—began a winery on the property, making it the oldest estate winery in the New York State. The current owners, Fred and Jennifer Johnson, have grown many European and hybrid varietals, but are particularly proud of their American heritage vines such as Ives Noir, which lends itself to excellent ports and other fortified wines.

In the service of the public, I decided to have a tasting or two. I found their Pinot Noir to be a classic, light, dry, and fruity Pinot, which is hard to find in an era where taste is often sacrificed for viscosity and alcohol content. Although I am not

Moving to the hand-cut bar with naturally textured edging and brass details, one finds not just wines, but

Sauv. Next, Michael recommended a specialty of the house and an oddity in the wine world, a semi-dry red served chilled. Developed in Minnesota to withstand the winters, the St. Croix is a lovely wine that tastes of dark berries and could easily replace a white on warm summer afternoons.

Yori stands out not just for what they're doing, but all that they're doing so well. From renovations to wines, beers, and food, they have an eye for detail and a knack for successful experimentation that other proprietors struggle to match.

Owners Sam and Becky Best know what they have working in their favor, and that is the amazing hilltop lake view. Arriving at Lakeview, you are greeted by rows of vines and a building façade that, though quaint, doesn't hint at the striking high-ceilinged A-frame view of the lake and countryside you'll enjoy while tasting their excellent

Seated at their wraparound counter filled with customer-provided sands and shells under glass (There are over 250 in the counter, ranging from the Great Lakes to the Middle East, with 250 more under the counter waiting to be displayed), one can enjoy their entirely locally sourced wines while marveling at the counter display.

Lakeview prefers to keep its collection of wines small, focusing on quality. Husband Sam, with his degree in enology, has won many awards. Their Cavitation, a semisweet, carbonated wine, has won several awards, including Double Gold from the American Wine Society. In fact, of their selection of eight wines, five have won awards, with thirteen total awards for their various wines.


Rather than focus on novelty wines or wide selections, Sam and Becky deliver what their customers want: beautiful views and excellent wines.

Those in Napa may not believe it, but they haven't sampled what I have and met the creative, determined growers that this region creates.

So, get in your car and go support a couple of local growers by drinking some wine. Or, on second thought, maybe take an Uber.

Chautauqua County Department of Planning and Development is proud announce that the County has been awarded a \$1 million grant through the New York State Empire State Development (NYS ESD) County Infrastructure Grant Program. This funding will be used to advance two transformative housing infrastructure projects strengthen communities, expand housing opportunities, support economic growth across Chautauqua County.

The grant funds will be allocated as follows:

- \$200,000 will support infrastructure costs to relocate sewer infrastructure for the Homesteads at Dunkirk Landing housing development project in the City of Dunkirk. This project, being implemented by Regan Development, will create 78 new housing units and help address a critical need for modern, high-quality housing options along the Lake Erie waterfront.
- \$800,000 will support infrastructure improvements

for the Welch's Building redevelopment project in the Village of Westfield, being implemented by Samuel Savarino. The funding will go toward electrical service upgrades, underground vault seal-offs, sidewalks, landscaping, and lighting improvements to facilitate the creation of 46 new housing units in the heart of Westfield's downtown district.

Both projects represent significant partnerships between the public and private sectors, leveraging state resources to spur long-term community and economic benefits.

Strengthening housing and infrastructure is critical to Chautauqua County competitive and livable," said PJ Wendel, Chautauqua County Executive. Election Commissioners remind voters to check polling locations and review sample ballots

Chautauqua County Election Commissioners Luz E. Torres and Nacole L. Ellis have announced that a total of 80,033 active voters are registered to participate in the upcoming General Election on Tuesday, November 4, 2025, with polls open from 6 a.m. to 9 p.m. across the county.

All voters with poll site changes have been mailed a blue postcard with the information on it.

Eligibility to Vote: Any New York State citizen at least age 18 at the date of the General Election who previously registered by October 25 is eligible to vote.

How to determine where to vote on Election Day, Status of Early Mail/Absentee Ballot and Voter Eligibility Status? Visit www. votechautauqua.com and click on "Voter Lookup and Ballot Tracker" to access the voter's current information, or call the Board of Elections at 716-753-4580

How to see a sample of the ballot?

Visit www.votechautauqua.com and click on "Sample Ballots" to view the Election Day ballot.

Bilingual Ballots

Voters outside the Cities of Dunkirk and Jamestown will notice all ballots are now bilingual, featuring both English and Spanish on each ballot due to new Election Law changes. Votes in the two Cities have had Bilingual ballots since 2024 and were previously offered separately, in English and Spanish.

Moved?

If a voter registered previously anywhere in New York State and is in current active or inactive voter registration status anywhere in New York State and failed to notify the Board of Elections, the voter may go to his or her new polling place on Election Day Nov. 5th or any county early voting site before the election, fill out a provisional affidavit ballot and once the voter is proven to be eligible, that ballot will be counted following the Election.

Voting Technology: Early voters and Election Day voters will sign in to vote on an electronic poll book tablet. The signature will be compared to the electronic voter registration signature on file.

Where to see election results?

www.votechautaugua.com have live county election night results starting at 9:15 p.m. Early Mail/Absentee & Early Voting totals will be posted on the county website after the polls close along with Election Day results from the Carlson Community Center. Election Day results will be added as available. Early Mail/Absentee ballots received after 3PM on Friday, October 31 and Affidavit Ballots will be counted and added to Election Day totals. Early Mail/ Absentee Ballots have 7 days to be returned (as long as they are postmarked by Election Day). Additionally, valid federal overseas and military ballots have until thirteen days after the election to be received and counted.

I am seeking reelection for two main reasons: more private sector jobs for our children and grandchildren and lower county taxes.

Chautauqua County is experiencing the pain of the loss of thousands of jobs in the last 15 years. That is not my opinion, that is a fact. Employment in Chautauqua County has plummeted from 68,000 in 2010 to 54,000 now. That is an economic disaster that explains much about our County's economic pain.

When thousands of working age parents lose their jobs, many leave the county and their children leave with them. That explains our county's population collapse from 2010's 135,000 to a census estimate of 125,000 now as well as the emptying out of many of our county's 18 school districts.

I have kept these unhappy facts in front of the County Legislature and its Economic Development Committee for the past two years.

Pretending everything in Chautauqua County is wonderful because two companies, Cummins in the South County and Wells, the ice-cream maker, in the North County are thankfully making huge investments does not make these two exceptions the rule.

Mayville wants you to forget Truck Lite (born in Jamestown in 1956) is gone along with at least 350 jobs. Jamestown Metal Products is gone along with 100 jobs. Serta Mattress and its approximately 100 jobs will be gone soon.

In the North County, Fredonia is still reeling from the loss of Carriage House (the former Red Wing) and its 500 jobs.

My role as a County Legislator and member of the Legislature's Economic Development Committee is to push and prod the county and its Chautauqua County Industrial Development Agency to laser focus on projects that will create private sector jobs, instead of giving away huge government subsidies to solar farms that literally produce no full-time jobs for our residents.

In my next term, I will work to

encourage the County and its Industrial Development Agency to work as partners to create more shovel-ready sites in the Greater Jamestown Area so that new businesses will have a place to locate and existing businesses will have a place to expand. This is how we can, again, increase private sector jobs.

Ihave the experience to make this happen. In 1998, as your County Attorney, I was a member of the County's Industrial Parks Task Force. Our work led to the creation of shovel-ready sites that resulted in Southern Tier Brewing Company being born in our County Industrial Park off of Hunt Road in Busti and resulted in Serta Mattress coming to our South County Industrial Park in Ellicott, where it has provided employment for hundreds of our residents for over 20 years. We had these successes before; we can repeat these successes if we try hard enough.

There are 3 tax reductions I want to achieve for you in 2026. I have voted for 2 years in a row to reduce your county property taxes by \$2,000,000. The taxpayers deserve that break and the county can easily afford it. I want to continue that fight in 2026.

For decades the Chautauqua County sales tax was 7%. Recently, the majority in the County Legislature has asked the State Legislature every two years to allow the county to charge an 8% sales tax.

This year, I proposed reducing the county sales tax to 7 3/4% for the next two years. I want to continue that fight in 2026. On the purchase of a new vehicle, for example, this reduction in our county sales tax would save you about \$100. I want that \$100 to be in your pocket and not in the County Treasury in Mayville.

The third tax reduction I will continue to pursue is for our senior citizen homeowners. The majority in the County Legislature set the income limit for the partial senior citizen property tax exemption at only \$30,000. I voted to support the recommendation of the leader of our County Office for Aging Services that the income limit be a more generous \$37,500, being approximately the official poverty line.

I end this campaign by telling you what I am for. I have not attacked my opponent. I have refused to engage in dirty politics, regardless of what the other side has done in this campaign for a purely local office.

Aimee Rogers to Receive Pam Lydic Coalition Builder Award

The Board of Directors of the CHQ Chamber has selected Aimee Rogers of Forestville to receive the Pam Lydic Coalition Builder Award for 2025. Aimee Rogers is the founder and president of Imagine Forestville, a group of area residents that turned the dissolution of the former Village of Forestville into an opportunity to bring people together around common objectives.

Imagine Forestville is a not-forprofit established in 2018 and dedicated to the preservation and enhancement of the historic hamlet to have a lasting legacy and be a welcoming rural community. Since the founding of Imagine Forestville, the group - spurred on by Aimee Rogers - has been meeting regularly and has secured funding to develop a nature trail for hiking, a farmer's market, and established a park with a picnic area. On a single day last year Imagine Forestville unveiled a new village clock, a Welcome to Forestville mural, and a repurposed historic horse trough that has created a garden spot in the hamlet.

Since 2024 Aimee Rogers has served on the Town of Hanover Board and the Chautauqua County Planning Board and is the liaison for the Town Planning and Zoning Boards. Working with the Chair of the Town Planning Board, they established a steering committee to update the Town of Hanover Comprehensive Plan, and this year they secured a \$20,000 grant to pay for a consultant for that project. She also oversaw a Main Street grant process and worked with consultants on building studies in the hamlet of Forestville, and this past summer the first home in the Town of Hanover at 21 Pearl Street, Forestville, was placed on the National Register of Historic

Aimee Rogers has also been active for many years in her church, St. Rose of Lima, which merged with Our Lady of Mount Carmel in 2018, and is the area liaison of the Pro-Life Diocesan Office. She is a social volunteer for the Forestville Fire Department, a member of the Fredonia Garden Club, and secretary for the Silver Creek Festival of Grapes. She is Assistant to the Area Director for the Board of Elections and has been a poll site coordinator for several years. She served as a 4-H leader for many years, on the 4-H Horse Committee for five years and still assists as a

County 4-H evaluator. She served on the CHQ Chamber Board of Directors from 2023-24. Aimee and her husband have five children and nine grandchildren.

Pam Lydic was the first President and CEO of the Chautauqua County Chamber of Commerce, having pulled together a variety of smaller community business organizations in order to strengthen the whole, financially and programmatically. Following her untimely passing in 2012, the Chamber launched this award in her memory to recognize an individual who has worked hard to bring groups of people together around a common goal or objective to move the region forward in a positive direction.

The award will be presented at the CHQ Chamber's Annual Meeting which will be held at noon, Friday, December 12 upstairs at Wicked Warren's in Jamestown. The keynote speaker will be Ronald Richard, the retired president and CEO of the Cleveland Foundation. THE SEVEN S'S OF TASTING

Wine is one of the most complex subjects to study. So wine tasting can seem like a daunting ordeal with a multitude of terminology and options available. Don't be overwhelmed though. By following some easy guidelines and studying some common patterns you can navigate the world of wine with ease.

SEE

Hold your glass to the light and look through the wine. The color of the wine will give away some basic secrets to the wine and will help guide you for the rest of the steps. Darker wines tend to be more bold and heavy than lighter wines which are more crisp and refreshing.

SWIRL

Air is beneficial for a wine. Proper aeration of wine helps to improve flavor by increasing the amount of scent produced. Swirling the glass (Not too hard! Don't spill!) will infuse air into the wine and allow scent molecules to leave the liquid and enter the air in the glass.

When wine coats and drips down the inside of the glass it is known as "legs". Higher alcohol levels cause more legs then lower alcohol and a sweeter wine has thicker and slower dripping legs (like syrup).

SMELL

Generally, you want to avoid sticking your whole nose into the glass. Start by putting just one nostril in and taking a slight sniff. Try to see what smells it reminds you of. But remember: There. Is. No. Wrong. Answer! Everyone will smell something different or have different words to explain the same smell. One person may describe a wine as "oaky", while someone else may say it makes them think of "shop class", or even "camp fire" for a smokey smell. A lot of your terms will be based on memories or experiences.

For White Wines, look for White Fruits: lemon, lime, orange, grapefruit, pineapple, peach, pear, and apple. For Red Wines, look for Red Fruits: cherry, blueberry, plum, blackberry, raspberry. Most of the time, look for those and you will find some. Wines can also have Floral notes (like rose, hibiscus, violet), Herbs and Veggies (like cut grass, oregano, bell peppers), Spice (like black pepper, liquorice), Woody (oaky, coffee, nutty, smokey), and so many many more!

SIP

Take your first sip of the wine. Swish it around in your mouth, and then swallow it. Just ignore this first sip. It tells you nothing about a wine. This is to coat your mouth and prepare for the wine. Don't take too much wine, as you need three sips to really experience what it has to offer.

SLURP

Take your second sip, and this time purse your lips and suck some air into the wine, or slurp. Don't be over the top with this so the whole winery can hear. You just want enough to get some air into the wine and really open it up. Move it around in your mouth, chew it, play with it. Start looking for different flavors. As with smell, with red wines look for red fruits, white wines seek out white fruits. There are no right or wrong answers, this is a personal experience. Eventually you will start learning certain grapes tend to have certain flavors, like Riesling has apple, Chardonnay has citrus.

SAVOR

Take your third sip and just enjoy it. This is the time to think of what meal to have it with, what special occasion to serve it at, who would want this as a gift, and if this is a wine that you want to purchase – the whole bottle.

SPIT!

It's okay to spit the wine after you taste. The point of tasting isn't to get drunk, it's to try new wines, learn, and know if you want to purchase it. Ask a staff member for a bucket and they will be happy to oblige.






