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

Baseball has always been a staple in Jamestown and throughout Chautauqua County. From the Jamestown Jimmies in the late 1930s, the Jamestown Jammers in the 1990s and 2000s to the current team, Jamestown Tarp Skunks, baseball has long been intertwined with the spirit of the city and a beloved sport for its residents.

klp0For me, it has been part of my life for as long as I can remember. Growing up just a mile from Diethrick Park, I vividly recall countless summer nights cheering on the Jamestown Jammers. But as a kid in the stands, I never imagined that one day I'd be leading the very organization that helped create so many of those memories.

What started as a summer internship in 2021 has exploded into nearly a half a million dollars in community support

over the last three years of my tenure as General Manager of the Jamestown Tarp Skunks. Now entering its fifth season, this team has brought baseball back to life in Jamestown. With it, a buzz and sense of community alliance has been renewed. When the Jamestown Jammers' final seasons saw declining attendance and lost momentum without minor league affiliation, the future of baseball here felt uncertain. But thanks to a vision



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
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

Surely it's not just me. We've all done it: listened in while someone nearby talked on the phone to a friend or coworker. And as we eavesdropped, we only heard that one party's replies, comments, and questions. Yet when it was all said and done, we were able to effectively piece together the general gist of the unheard party's input, not flawlessly but adequately.

Studying the Bible is a lot like that experience, especially when it comes to certain genres (types of literature) we find within its pages. In a way, we're listening in on one side of a conversation. We are reading the words of one of God's scribes, prophets, or apostles. We don't necessarily know everything about the original audience (the unheard party), but we can still reasonably piece together the gist of the other party's involvement in the conversation.

In our fifth and final installment in this series on personal Bible study, we'll consider a few more genres of Scripture where this idea of becoming good "eavesdroppers" applies.

First, let's think about epistles. Epistles are letters from early church leaders to congregations and/or individuals in specific cities or geographical regions. As such, they are occasional documents. That means epistles are written because something has happened, is happening, or is about to happen. When reading an epistle, try to do so in one sitting, as you would any personal letter you received. That it together.' way you're "overhearing the entire conversation." Look for repeated themes, developing arguments, and any clues in the text that might help you piece together the specific occasion(s) that prompted the author to write this letter. As you get a better picture of what was taking place then, you can then start to ask yourself questions related to your life now. Questions like, What were the recipients of this epistle failing to understand about God and his loving intentions for them? What timeless truths did the author of this

letter share with his audience then? If history tends to repeat itself, how might I be needing to hear these same timeless truths today?

Next, let's talk a bit about Psalms. Like the epistles, the psalms are occasional documents in that specific events in the lives of God's people inspired their composition. But unlike the epistles, where the one side you're overhearing is God's toward his people, the psalms allow you to overhear God's people's perspective toward him. And unlike the epistles, which are more literal, communicating through straightforward prose, the psalms are more lyrical, communicating their truths through poetry. Like so many songs we sing today, the psalms are written to reach the mind through the heart. So when you read a psalm, don't expect technical precision. Expect artistic expression. Look for lots of imagery, metaphors, repetition, hyperbole,

etc. Don't expect too much of an individual psalm. Like any song, it can't exhaustively treat a given subject, be it ethical or theological. And don't be surprised when a psalm leaves you with a sense of wanting more or even unresolved tension. The psalms don't always have "happy endings." That is by design. It's part of the artistry of poetry. It's not always written to give you the final answer to a dilemma but to get you thinking and, hopefully, praying. Indeed, one of the most beautiful things about the psalms is the fact that God saw fit to preserve the very songs that record his people's "wrestlings" and doubts with him. It's his way of saying to you, "I get it. I know life is tough. Look and see that you're not the first to struggle. Let's talk about

contract." Is it possible to think of exceptions to a given proverb? Sure, but that's not the point. The point is to communicate helpful words of wisdom and warning in short, easily memorized sayings that will encourage you to live with a healthy awareness of who God is and what he wants for the people he's created in his image. Second, in relation to books like Job and Ecclesiastes, understand that much of what's said by the individual characters speaking within the storyline is inadequate or even seriously flawed. These flawed statements (by Job's friends or by "the preacher" early on in Ecclesiastes) are part of the plotline and tension that is eventually resolved in a satisfactory way. But you have to listen to the entire conversation to get the point. So keep reading.

Much more could be said about each of the above 3 genres. And we haven't even touched on other



prominently featured genres like Gospels, parables, the prophets, and apocalyptic literature,* but hopefully you've been encouraged to see Bible study as something that's accessible. Most importantly, my prayer is that you'll "overhear" the voice of the God who loves you in those sacred pages.

(*If you'd like to further explore the study of the Bible's varied genres, I highly recommend Kristie Anyabwile's primer on transformative Bible study entitled Literarily.)

Finally, let's consider Wisdom Literature. We're talking here about Job, Proverbs, Ecclesiastes, and Song of Solomon. While these books can be challenging reads, they're also rewarding ones so long as you keep a few key guidelines in mind. First, when it comes to Proverbs, remember that you're dealing with short wisdom sayings not exhaustive treatments on a given subject. Think "bumper sticker" rather than "legal


how much I loved that place ... the fence by the dugout, the top row of the bleachers, and the grass by the JCC parking lot, where I often searched post-game for home run balls, how much that place was a second home for my Dad and me.

Throughout the games, my Dad would explain the finer rules to me - like the nuances of the infield-fly rule. Between innings, he poetically argued how a condiment-loaded hot dog can hold its own against a fine-dining meal anywhere. At all other times, he was the one holding the programs, the baseballs, and the newspaper clippings, remembering just whose autograph I still needed for each one. He was the one who introduced me to each player; the one who read the player bios and

told me where the guys grew up. He told me when the slugger was coming to bat and when to watch for a double-play. My Dad was the conductor of that summer, and he saw to it that I fell in love with America's game. If you ask him, though, he'd probably say he was just being a good dad.

The Jamestown Expos will always have a place in my heart. Russell E. Diethrick Jr. Park will have an even bigger place. That said, the value of both lies in how much they allowed a boy and his father to live their best life and have their best summer that year. As much as I was surrounded by guys I adored, and giants I looked up to, the hero of 1989 didn't wear a jersey.





FROM YOUTH TO 80: A LIFETIME OF IMPACT AT THE JAMESTOWN YMCA

At 80 years old, Jon Nelson isn't slowing down. A lifelong Jamestown resident, Jon has faced more than his share of physical challenges — including six joint replacements — but still shows up at the YMCA almost every morning.

"This place keeps me going," Jon says simply. "If I had to do my rehab at home, I probably wouldn't do it. But coming here — it gives me structure, accountability, and people."

Jon's connection to the Jamestown Area YMCA dates back nearly seven decades to when he was just a kid tagging along with his dad.

"I started coming with my dad when I was a kid," Jon recalls. "There was a space just for kids to hang out, and before long, I was getting involved in activities and meeting people from all over."

One of those early connections t — with a Jamestown High School f student named George Banks — _____ left a lasting impression and hel-

ped Jon feel right at home.

Over the years, the Y became a constant in Jon's life. He played handball for years before joint issues forced him to scale back. Now, his workouts are simpler light cardio, walking, stretching — but they're just as essential.

More than the equipment or the routines, though, it's the people who keep Jon coming back.

"The girls at the front desk greet you with a smile. The members talk to each other. You walk in and you feel like someone's happy to see you," he says. "You don't get that everywhere."

He treasures the sense of community at the Jamestown Y. It's where he's built lifelong friendships, and where he continues to set goals — including traveling to play new golf courses and giving back to hospitals that have supported him.

When Jon turned 80 earlier this year, he said he felt something simple but meaningful: a desire to say thank you. He penned a four-page letter to the Y staff to

Others suggest it's the result of conscious decisions by film directors; Christopher Nolan is an oft-cited example in whose films dialogue often seems just more than a whisper. Still others maintain an increase in the use and volume of sound effects is at fault. This debate has gotten more prevalent in just the past few years.

Whatever the cause, says Davis, audiences are taking notice and in some instances, staying out of movie theatres. "Several of our patrons have said they prefer watching movies at home where they can turn on their TV's closed captions. We're hoping to bring them back into the theatre," he adds, "at least on Tuesday nights."



The Chautauqua County Department of Mental Hygiene (CCDMH) is proud to announce the certification and official opening of a new satellite mental health office within Southern Tier Pediatrics, P.C. This milestone marks a significant advancement in the County's commitment to accessible, timely, and communitybased behavioral health care for children and their caregivers.

This new site is a satellite of the Jamestown Chautauqua County Department of Mental Hygiene, Certified Community Behavioral Health Center. The satellite is made possible by the partnership between the New York State Office of Mental Health, the Chautauqua Tapestry Grant supported through the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA), and a collaboration with local healthcare providers. The goal: bring critical mental health services directly into pediatric primary care—where families already receive trusted care and stigma of receiving treatment for support.

The launch of this site is on the heels of Mental Health Awareness Month and Youth Mental Health Acceptance Week, both dedicated to promoting acceptance and reducing the stigma around mental health challenges among young people. By embedding mental health services into a pediatric office, the County and its partners are helping normalize behavioral health support as an essential part of overall wellness.

"For those of you behind the scenes, you don't get to see what this is doing for the children and families in the community," Patricia D'Angelo, Southern Tier Pediatrics Practice Administrator shared. "We have the privilege of seeing the positive impact of providing mental health services in a primary care pediatric setting. This collaboration with CCDMH allows us the opportunity to show our families that we value mental health just as much as physical health. Collectively, we are removing the mental health by placing it side by side with physical health."

"This is more than a win — it's a legacy," Borrello added. "The Lady Bears have etched their names into Frewsburg history, and we are honored to help celebrate that achievement."



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


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
