

3-4 cups frozen or canned berries/ fruit, or canned pie filling

6 tbsp butter, melted

1 egg, slightly beaten







Panama Rocks Prepares for a Wild Weekend at the Wild America Nature Festival

estled in the heart of Chautauqua County, Panama Rocks is a place where time slows down and the steady thrum of forest life, ancient rock, flora and fauna come together under a canopy of trees. But this weekend, this serene forest will take on a new kind of energy as it hosts one of the region's most anticipated events: the Wild America Nature Festival, happening Saturday Sunday, July 19 and 20, from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. both days.

With more than 45 artisan vendors, live music, wildlife shows, food trucks, expert-led nature talks and activities for the whole family, the festival transforms Panama Rocks into a buzzing celebration of creativity and the natural world.

"Everything we do here is

rooted in the idea of helping people connect with nature, with each other and with themselves," said Jonathan Weston, owner of Panama Rocks. "The Wild America Festival is our way of throwing open the forest gates and saying, 'Come explore. Come play. Come be amazed."

The Wild America Nature Festival is part makers' market, part wildlife encounter, part forest fairytale. The vendor includes lineup painters, illustrators, woodworkers, Paul's Rocket Stoves, jewelers ceramicists, and blacksmiths, all showcasing goods inspired by or crafted from nature.

"We appreciate the artisan community for showing up for our festival," Weston said. "They pour their hearts and souls into their products, food and services and we cannot thank them enough for sharing that with our visitors."

Food is just as thoughtfully selected, with a wide array of options including vegetarian offerings, sweets and treats. Festival favorites like Labyrinth Press Co., Another Guy's Fries, ComaradERIE BBQ, Everyday's a Sundae and Hope's Smoothies will be on hand, along with treats like

Ace Kettle Corn and Ramsey Concessions.

The festival also offers live folk music by Davis and Eng, whimsical family fun like balloon animals, face painting and DIY plushie-making, and up-close animal encounters that will thrill any age. Wildlife expert Chris Duckett of WILD Creatures brings a rotating cast of reptiles, birds, and mammals for educational shows at 11 a.m. each day. Hawk Creek will also be on hand for an additional animal presentation on Saturday at 2 p.m.

"People are blown away when they realize how close they can get to some of these animals," Weston said. "It's not just about looking, it is also about learning, and respecting the wild."

Kids and the young-at-heart can also meet goats, sheep, and rabbits at the Sundance Kids Petting Zoo, while the more curious-minded can join guided talks and walks on tree identification, bats, native plants and foraging.

"It's a little bit of everything," Weston said. "And somehow it all works together, because the forest brings it all to life."

God's Groceries Food Pantry: A Decade of Feeding the Panama Community

For overten years, Tina Swineford has led God's Groceries Food Pantry, a ministry deeply rooted in service and compassion. Operated through the Panama Methodist Church at 22 East Main Street in Panama (Church Street entrance), the pantry has long served as an important lifeline for families facing food insecurity within the Panama Central School District.

Even without the festival, Panama Rocksis a destination worth exploring. The park's main attraction is a one-mile loop trail that winds around towering rock formations, crevices, passageways and hidden caves that are remnants of a 300-million-year-old ocean floor.

Off-trail exploration is allowed for those with sturdy shoes and a sense of adventure. It's part hike, part natural playground and all magic.

"People have told me it feels like stepping into a different world," Weston said.

Privately operated since 1885, Panama Rocks is one of the oldest continuously run nature parks in the country. It has no state funding and relies entirely on admission and community support to stay open and protected.

In addition to hiking, the park now offers glamping and camping, making it an ideal weekend retreat. Visitors can book overnight stays in rustic tents or bring their own setups and enjoy a night under the stars, surrounded by the enchanting forest.

Festival admission is \$12 for adults and \$10 for seniors, veterans, military members and youth ages 6 to 12. Children five and under are free. Parking is \$5 in the designated field lot, with limited free street parking nearby.

Panama Rocks is located at 11 Rock Hill Road in Panama. The park is open daily from May through October, 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. Glamping and camping options are available by reservation. Outside of the festival weekend, general admission to the park is \$10 for adults and \$8 for children ages 6 to 12, with discounted rates available for seniors, veterans, and military at \$9. Season passes are \$19 for adults, \$15 for youth, and \$17 for discounted categories. Kids 5 and under are free. 



Local MLTC and Support Programs in Chautauqua County

Office for Aging Services

Chautauqua County offers several managed long-term care (MLTC) programs to support individuals who are chronically ill or disabled and wish to remain in their homes and communities. These programs provide a range of services, including medical and non-medical care, to help individuals live independently

1. CASA (Community Alternative Systems Agency)

Operated by the Chautauqua County Department of Social Services, CASA assists residents of all ages with planning and obtaining long-term care services. CASA nurses conduct home visits to assess medical and non-medical care needs, explain available services and payment options, and make referrals to appropriate programs.

2. NY Connects: Aging & Disability Resource Center

NY Connects is a free, locally based point-of-entry service that provides unbiased information and assistance to individuals seeking long-term services and supports. The program helps assess needs, identify appropriate services, and make referrals to agencies and programs. It serves older adults, individuals with disabilities, caregivers, and others in Chautauqua County.

3. Health Homes of Upstate NY (HHUNY)

The Chautauqua County Department of Mental Hygiene serves as a Lead Health Home, coordinating care for Medicaid beneficiaries with complex chronic health and/or behavioral health needs. Health Home services include care management to ensure effective coordination and management of care, leading to positive health outcomes.

4. In-Home & Community Care Services

The Chautauqua County Office for Aging Services offers home and community care services designed to keep older adults safe and independent in the community. Services include housekeeping, personal care, home-delivered meals, and personal emergency response systems. The program also provides assistance with accessing Medicaid and Veterans Administration home care benefits

5. Managed Medicaid

For individuals aged 18 and older with chronic illnesses or disabilities, there is a Medicaid Managed Long-Term (MLTC) Care plan in Chautauqua County. MLTC provides services such as Personalized care management Consumer and coordination, Directed Personal Assistance Services (CDPAS), Home health care and rehabilitation therapies, medical transportation and durable medical equipment, Social and environmental support services.





Jamestown Farmers Market Awarded \$50,000 Grant to Boost Year-Round Access to Local Food and Support Farmers

The Jamestown Farmers Market (JFM), a cornerstone of the downtown community and a growing hub for local food access, has been awarded a \$50,000 Farmers Market Resiliency Grant from New York State. This critical funding will help expand the market's reach, increase farmer participation, and improve yearround access to fresh, locally grown food.

The grant will directly support the expansion of off-season growing by providing greenhouse subsidies to both current and prospective vendors. These subsidies will fund the purchase and improvement of greenhouse infrastructure, including heating systems and equipment upgrades. The goal is to significantly increase the availability of freshly harvested produce during months—particularly through JFM's newly launched Winter Farmers Market, which completed its first full season in 2024 with up to 14 weekly vendors in the St. Luke's Church Undercroft.

"This funding allows us to invest in the resilience of our farmers and ensure local food access doesn't stop when the summer ends," said Nick Weith, Food Access Manager at St. Luke's Episcopal Church, the host organization of JFM. "We're helping farmers grow more, for longer—and helping the community eat better, year-round."

Increasing capacity is the theme of the season. Recently, the Western New York Foundation has selected the Jamestown Farmers Market as a recipient of its iCap Core program, which provides technical assistance to strengthen organizational capacity. The Foundation will

also support the greenhouse project, offering crucial tools to ensure farmers succeed in adapting to changing climate conditions and increasing consumer demand for fresh, local products.

Currently, fewer than 10% of Chautauqua County farms sell directly to consumers, according to Cornell Cooperative Extension. This initiative aims to reverse that trend—connecting more farmers directly with residents and addressing food insecurity in downtown Jamestown, a state-designated area of concentrated poverty.

Beyond growing capacity, the grant will also support new efforts to make the downtown market space more welcoming. A "Greening the Market" initiative will install planters featuring native trees, shrubs, and flowers. These planters will create a park-like setting—inviting deeper community connection and enhancing the customer experience.

An expanded marketing and outreach campaign will include a new user-friendly website, street pole banners, posters at businesses and community centers, and direct mailers to promote the market and its expanded offerings.

With the combined support of state and regional partners, the Jamestown Farmers Market is poised to become a vibrant, year-round marketplace that uplifts local farmers, strengthens the local food economy, and ensures greater access to local food for all.

Farmers who are interested in applying for a grant to expand their greenhouse capacity can





PA Wilds Center, the backbone nonprofit for the regional movement, said that while the book was a personal project, she hopes it helps advance the Wilds cause and others like it.

"Locally-led, place-based development is happening in communities all across the country and is so deserving of support," Enos said. "Every person can make a difference. I really wanted to connect with readers on that. In order to do that, I knew I was going to have to take some risks, to personalize my own journey trying to lead this kind of work in my own community, and be as real as I could in the writing, including about my own skepticism, flaws and shortcomings. The late author Edora Welty said, 'One place understood helps us understand all places better.' My hope is there are lessons from our journey in the Wilds that translate and are useful to others."

Enos relied on interviews, public Trail, Enos, a former journalist in Alaska and founder and CEO of the PA Wilds Center, the backbone nonprofit for the regional movement, said that while the book was a personal project, she hopes it helps advance the Wilds cause and others like it.

Narratives about a place are powerful things," Enos said. "Too often in rural America, and definitely in Appalachia, they are told by people from outside and through a lens that is often negative. The Wilds work had some rocky moments, but our region stuck with it, and to me what we've accomplished together is such an inspiring story. I mean, there's a lot of ways to get tourism development wrong. And rural PA is doing a lot of things right. We've become a national model because of it."

Enos just returned this week from keynoting the Blue Ridge Rising conference, which focuses place-based community development happening along the Blue Ridge Parkway in Virginia and North Carolina. In August she is scheduled to appear on the live-streamed book show series, On the Front Porch, which is hosted by Brookings Institute's Tony Pipa American Enterprise Institute's Brent Orrell.

Enos said she is excited to collaborate with Good Neighbor Bookstore and be in Chautauqua County. "I lived in the area for a while when I was a kid," Enos said. "I went to Lakewood, Celeron and Love elementary schools. My mom and sister both went to JCC."

At the signing event, Enos will be distributing fliers for the upcoming show at the Roger Tory Peterson Institute, "Knowing Where to Stand: North America Nature Photographers Association Environmental Impact Award Winners," which opens August 9.

Nobody Speaks Swedish to Me Anymore

What I miss most (after my Mom and Dad and beloved Godfather, Albin Peterson), is hearing the Swedish language.

My Dad, John Thorstenson, came to America from Sweden via Canada. This was in the early 1920s and Dad was only about 20 when he came to Jamestown. Although there was a big Swedish community, it was difficult to find work without speaking English and as many immigrants did, be went to night school to learn the language of his newly adopted country. He always spoke with a Swedish accent but even when he spoke Swedish, he often threw in a few English words.

My Mom, Alice Swanson, was born in this country to immigrants from Sweden and spoke only Swedish until she went to kindergarten. I'm sure that Swedish was always spoken in their home, but my mother was the oly one of the five siblings who spoke Swedish. In fact, her Swedish was purer than Dad's. Years later, when we had relatives from Sweden or when they visited Dad's home country, there was always laughing and teasing about which one was the born Swede.

I remember being among friends and relatives and hearing the Swedish. learned to understand almost everything said but unfortunately never learned to speak Swedish. Before I visited Sweden in 1996, I took Swedish from Jeff Kroon at Jamestown Community College (in fact, I took it twice, once with my friend Joan Shevory and once with Svea Hjalmarson, who just wanted to polish up a little) but didn't seem to be able to work up the nerve to actually speak it. I'm not a particularly shy person, but somehow I was reticent about speaking a language that wasn't my first language, and gto by listening to Swedish and answering in English, while my relatives pretty much did the same thing in reverse. It worked, but I wish I had tried harder.

When I was a kid most of Jamestown was either Swedish or Italian, and it was customary to hear both languages spoken on the streets and in the stores. I imagine that almost anyone in Jamestown could speak at least a few words of Swedish. I thought little of having parents that spoke a second language, and I'm sure most of my peers felt the same way. I remember an incident in grade school at Charles Street School when a man of Albanian descent came to the office and could not make himself understood a girl in

my class, Martha Vangel, was called to the office to translate for the man. That was not an unusual occurrence, although Albanian was not a common language in Jamestown at that time.

Back in those days parents did not hire babysitters to go out for an evening, at least not in my parents' circle, and I went with them when they visited friends and relatives. What fun it was to listen to their laughter and hear the Swedish language from friends of theirs like Gunnar Ahlstedt, Emil and Irene Seaburg, Carl and Mary Johnson, Carl and Ingrid Hogland, my aunt and uncle Thorsten and Greta, and of course, my Godfather, who remained a bachelor all his life but who spent much of his time with my family. There was always coffee and some of the wonderful pastries that Swedes make so well. I loved those evenings.

Mom and Dad belonged to the Skone Club, and that was fun, too. We always had treats and could run around in the large facility located in the Nordic Temple on the corner of Second and Prendergast

Dad developed dementia in his last few years and remarkably spoke Swedish less than he had before, but sometimes surprising us, as when he spoke a mild Swedish exclamation while coming out of anesthesia after surgery for a broken hip. Mom and I looked at each other and grinned... Dad remembered his

After Dad died, Mom spoke Swedish less and less because there was no one left to talk to except very occasionally. She kept a clear mind and a remarkable memory, and I know that she hadn't forgotten anything; but the need wasn't there.

Now it is sometimes weeks or months at a time before I hear the language that was such a big part of my life. Thankfully, my cousin, Pete Thorstenson, speaks Swedish well and keeps it a little fresh in my mind. But if anyone speaks Swedish to me, I love to listen!

Mrs. McNallie was a first generation American on her father's side, and second generation on her mother's Swanson side. She grew up in Jamestown at a time when she recalls it being common to have been a Swedish, Italian or even Albanian immigrant to Jamestown. She still lives in the city today at nearly 90-years young, this August 18th! She swims daily at the Jamestown Boys and Girls Club and enjoys being active at the Marvin House, Norden Club and her church community.






